The exhibition takes us back into Trondheim life in the Catholic Middle Ages, about 1050 to 1537.

This re-creation of the town is based on objects and architectural fragments found below the streets of Trondheim.

The moist layers of soil have preserved clothing, shoes, cups and dishes, toys and much more so well that you can almost sense the presence of the medieval people.

Our exhibition includes Norway's oldest log buildings, found in Trondheim.

The houses have been restored to their original state, as the archaeological discoveries indicate that they used to be.

Summer visit to Ringve Botanical Gardens
14 June at 18:00

At Ringve Botanical Gardens, you can enjoy the glorious flowers, discover a wide variety of plants, shrubs and trees, find inspiration for your own garden, or simply relax.

Established as university gardens in 1973, they are run by the NTNU Museum of Natural History and Archaeology.

The gardens cover 130 decares (about 32 acres) and have a magnificent setting with beautiful views of the Trondheim Fjord.

Behind the barn and the *stabbur* (traditional storehouse on pillars) at Ringve is the Renaissance garden, a herb garden infused with local history.

Established in 1994, the garden includes medicinal plants, vegetables, ornamental plants, fibre plants, herbs and spice plants that were grown in Trondheim in the 17th century.

Other highlights at Ringve include the Primrose Garden, the Traditional Perennials, the Ornamental Beds and the Historical Park. Your guide for the visit is Vibekke Vange.
