## **European Congress on Tropical Medicine and International Health 2017**

First of all, we would like to thank the Norwegian Research School of Global Health for the support and opportunity to attend the European Congress on Tropical Medicine and International Health (ECTMIH) in Antwerp, Belgium, October 16-20, 2017. ECTMIH is a renowned and well-established conference with distinguished speakers and participants from all over the world with expertise in both tropical medicine and global health. This year, the conference had over 1500 participants.

Unfortunately, Maren had to withdraw her presentation right before the panel due to pressure from one of the organisations she has studied. This illustrates how politicized the field has become and how difficult it can be to do research on abortion.

The session we organized was well attended (approximately 50-60 people), which was great given the other interesting parallel sessions happening at the same time. It was amazing to be able to present our research to such a highly qualified audience, and there was a lot of questions and discussions after the presentations.

To conclude, we felt that the session was successful for us organizing and presenting, and it seemed like the audience was content as well. It would not have been possible to organize this panel without

the support from the Research School, and it gave us confidence to do similar things in the future. We will take this experience with us in our continuous work as researchers.

It was also great to see other participants from the Research School having posters and oral presentations at the conference. Additionally, we got new contacts and learned a lot from attending a great range of sessions concerning the area of tropical medicine and international health.
