<sup>2</sup>Dr. <u>Rachel Donkersloot</u> is an anthropologist with broad policy and research expertise in rural fishing communities across the North Pacific and North Atlantic. She works at the College of Fisheries and Ocean Sciences at the University of Alaska Fairbanks Her work concentrates on issues of fishing community sustainability, equity, rural well-being, Alaska Native livelihoods, marine resource governance, and contemporary youth in the Global North, and incorporates and respects diverse forms of data and knowledge that can improve management and decision-making processes.

<sup>3</sup>Professor <u>Svein Jentoft</u> is a sociologist and a Professor Emeritus at the Norwegian College of Fishery Science, Faculty of Bioscience, Fisheries and Economics, UiT- the Arctic University of Norway. He is current Editor in Chief for Maritime Studies and a co-editor of the Mare book series on Springer. Throughout his career his work has focused on social and political issues related to fisheries and marine affairs, specialising in small-scale fisheries management, law, corporate and interactive governance, environmental resource management and comanagement, through socially and culturally informed solutions.

<sup>4</sup><u>Michael Corbett</u> is a Professor of Education in Acadia University in Wolfville, Nova Scotia, Canada. His original and critical research focuses on the dynamic and ambivalent relationship between life in rural coastal communities and the structures and processes of schooling. He has worked with rural communities and schools in Australia and Canada as well as doing international comparative work in Norway and Finland.

<sup>5</sup><u>Stuart Aitken</u> is a geographer and distinguished professor at College of Arts and Letters, at San Diego State University. He is one of the forerunners in the interdisciplinary field of Childhood Research, and has published widely. His expertise covers global childhoods, child rights, youth activism, families and communities, geography of film and spatial philosophies.
