EDUCATION

BACHELOR STUDENT EXCHANGE PROGRAMS



Despite pandemic-related restrictions, some international exchange programs were possible in 2022. Six nursing students from NTNU's Gjøvik campus participated in an exchange to Namibia. They were hosted in Windhoek, the capital city, and visited hospitals like Katutura State Hospital, Windhoek Central Hospital and Psychiatry Hospital. They also visited a pre-primary school called Findano. The students returned home with many insights from low-resource settings.

GLOBAL HEALTH PROJECTS FOR MEDICAL STUDENTS



Several medical students, including Andrea Raen and Silje Selseng, conducted global health projects during their research semesters. Andrea and Silje worked with Associate Professor Ingunn Harstad on a project that was published in the *Journal of Clinical Tuberculosis and Other Mycobacterial Diseases* in 2022.

PRAKASH KUMAR MAHTO

PhD Candidate, Department of Neuromedicine and Movement Science (INB)

Main supervisor: Ann-Katrin Stensdotter (NTNU). Co-supervisors: Monica Unsgaard Tøndel (NTNU), Vaneshveri Naidoo (University of Witwatersrand), and Sunil Kumar Joshi (Kathmandu Medical College).

"I am a registered PhD student at the Faculty of Medicine and Health Sciences at NTNU. My research interests lie in the area of low back pain - a prevalent non-communicable disease that is recognized as a major global health concern.

As a musculoskeletal physiotherapist working in Nepal, I've treated many patients with musculoskeletal conditions, especially with low back pain. I've also always had an interest in research and academia. I've conducted some research already on musculoskeletal disorders at my institute in Nepal, and published articles. This work sparked my desire to delve deeper into this area of study in my PhD.

I also currently lead a Bachelor's of Physiotherapy program in Nepal. There are few opportunities to obtain PhD degrees in Nepal, and a person leading a program like mine requires a senior-level faculty member with higher qualifications.

My hope is that my PhD research will provide a relevant tool for assessing low back pain and musculoskeletal disorders in general, in a local language. By shedding light on how people are coping with these conditions and how to approach them in both rural and urban areas in Nepal, I believe my research will make a valuable contribution to the field of global health."

UPDATES FROM TWO NTNU NORHED II PROJECTS FOR GLOBAL HEALTH

Through the NORHED II program, the Norwegian Agency for Development Cooperation (NORAD) funds partnerships for capacity development in higher education and research.

STRENGTHENING CAPACITY IN PHYSIOTHERAPY EDUCATION IN NEPAL

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS IN 2022:

- NTNU and Wits University collaborated to deliver an online course for Kathmandu University School of Medicine Sciences (KUSMS) and Kathmandu Medical College (KMC) physiotherapy faculty, with external expertise from OsloMet.
- Nepal's first master's program in physiotherapy was accredited, with 5 open seats for enrollment at KUSMS.
- KMC started a new bachelor's program in physiotherapy with 30 students.
- A 2-day workshop was hosted in Nepal on integrating gender and social inclusiveness in higher education.

TRAINING PROGRAM TO IMPROVE MATERNAL & NEONATAL HEALTH IN MALAWI

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS IN 2022:

- Collaboration consolidated between NTNU and the Malawi University of Science and Technology (MUST), Kamuzu University of Health Sciences (KUHeS) and University of Zambia - School of Nursing (UNZASoN).
- Development of online and in-person master's and PhD programs.
- Supported midwife-led ultrasound scanning to date pregnancy in Malawi and Zambia as part of a national program to offer standardized ultrasounds in gestational week 18.
- Four *new* curricula developed in 2022: PhD in Maternal and Neonatal Health, MSc. in Diagnostic Ultrasound, MSc. Medical Microbiology, and MSc. in Infection and Immunity.
- Five revised curricula: two PhDs in Midwifery, two MSc. in Midwifery, one MSc. in Reproductive Health, and one BSc.

CAPACARE CELEBRATED 10 YEARS OF SURGICAL TRAINING IN WEST AFRICA



- NTNU collaborating partner, the NGO <u>CapaCare</u>, celebrated 10 years of training students in life-saving surgical and obstetric skills.
- Since 2012, more than 90 trainees have been enrolled into the Surgical Training Programme of which 70 have graduated,
- Trainees and graduates have performed or taken part in more than 70 000 surgical operations.
- 90 international trainers has made over 250 trips and delivered more than 350 courses.
- More than 40 peer-review papers in international journals makes Sierra Leone a country where the surgical system and challenges and opportunities of introducing surgical task-sharing is well documented.

PICTERUS AS

Neonatal jaundice is a leading cause of death and brain damage in low- and middle-income countries where accurate detection devices can be prohibitively expensive or unavailable. The Picterus smartphone app developed by NTNU & St. Olavs clinicians and researchers provides a low-cost solution for estimating newborn jaundice levels.

In 2022, Picterus was involved in several global health collaborations at NTNU, engaging master's, medical, and PhD students in the company's activities.

NTNU and SINTEF have a long history of collaboration in the field of global health. In 2022, this collaboration was formalized. This new agreement solidifies a commitment to working together on global health activities and initiatives.

PROFESSOR EMERITA

NTNU's first Professor of Global Health, Elisabeth Darj, was hired in 2013 and became Professor Emerita this year. She is leaving her position with pride after developing and successfully launching the MSc degree program in global health, which continues to attract over 500 student applications per year for its 25 available seats. In addition, Elisabeth obtained a 6-year grant from the Research Council of Norway for PhD education which established the Norwegian Research School in Global Health (NRSGH). More than 200 PhD candidates from around the world have benefited from the NRSGH's seminars, courses, and networking opportunities. ISM-NTNU is the host for the school.



JON ØYVIND ODLAND

PROFESSOR EMERITUS

Jon Øyvind Odland was hired as NTNU's second Professor of Global Health in 2018, and took over leadership of the MSc program in Global Health during a challenging period of the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite the obstacles, Jon had the pleasure of supervising and working with highly skilled and motivated students who made excellent contributions to the field. Moreover, his professorship concluded with more than 50 peer-reviewed articles with many students as first authors, and five PhD candidates completing their studies despite the pandemic's challenges.


RISA LONNEE-HOFFMAN AND SUNILA SHAKYA AWARDED RESEARCH COUNCIL OF NORWAY FUNDING

Risa Lonnee-Hoffman from NTNU-St. Olavs and Sunila Shakya from KUSMS-Dhulikhel Hospital, along with other partners, were awarded competitive grant funding for an upcoming study from the Research Council of Norway. The study, which begins in 2023, involves a randomized controlled trial that will evaluate the effectiveness of point-of-care tests (POCTs) in reducing the overtreatment of abnormal vaginal discharge with antibiotics in Nepal.
