Highlights:

- Improve your supervision skills and strategies

- Learn how to recruit good candidates and build a research group
- Develop your career plan and think strategically about supervision
- Discuss everyday challenges with other supervisors in your field

About the program: The workshop is organized by the <u>Norwegian Research School in Neuroscience (NRSN)</u> and the <u>Norwegian Research School in Medical Imaging (MedIm)</u>. The program is tailor-made for supervisors in the early stages of their career and will focus on challenges that are particularly relevant in the fields of neuroscience and medical imaging. Special guest is Professor Robert Harris from Karolinska Institutet in Stockholm, who will introduce participants to 'Intended Learning Outcomes' as a tool for efficient project planning and supervision.

Target group: The workshop is intended for researchers at post-doc level and above who are working in the field of neuroscience or medical imaging. All participants must have some experience with PhD supervision in order to attend. There is a maximum of 30 participants, and we give priority to the main supervisors of PhD students who are members of NRSN or MedIm. If your stduent is not yet a member, (s)he can register now via registration form NRSN or registration form MedIm. International applicants may participate against a course fee of 3000 NOK and must pay for their own travel and accommodation. Local applicants will be prioritized.

Practical arrangements: There is no course fee, and NRSN/MedIm will cover the costs of travel, accommodation and meals. To stimulate networking, also those living in Trondheim are welcome to stay in the hotel at our cost. Participants are asked to make their own travel arrangements, and we will reimburse the expenses after the event.

Preparations: Prior to the workshop we will send a brief questionnaire to the participants' PhD candidates where we ask them to assess the strengths of their supervisors and identify potential for improvement. The questionnaire will form the basis of an informal assignment at the beginning of the workshop, where participants get to know each other and reflect upon their qualities as supervisors.
